GH presented 2 alternative group charter statements to the group for consideration. Option 1 A Community Liaison Group established to: Provide a forum for Waterloo and Stony Gap Wind Farm projects and related renewable energy topics to be discussed; and Provide opportunity for community engagement and feedback.

4.	Overview of EnergyAustralia Mid North Wind Farm Projects – Mike Clee and Clint Purkiss	
4.1	 Waterloo Wind Farm Update MC provided an update on Waterloo Wind Farm. Favourable wind conditions during July 2014 resulted in a capacity factor of 53.56% (target 39.68%) and a new monthly record Net Generation of 43.58GWh (target 32.52GWh). However, we have generally experienced lower than predicted winds during the above period. Financial Year to Date Net production is tracking at -7.5 % against plan. MC advised that wind farms across Australia are about 10% down. SW asked if climate change will effect this. MC responded that it is impossible to predict this at this stage. On the 30th December 2014 at 03:40, A circuit (7 WTG's) tripped due a fault on the Main Feeder Cable. The Root Cause Analysis Report stated that the joint failed as there was a very high impedance in each of the phases, causing a high level of power dissipation which resulted in the temperature in the joint to rise well above the maximum design level. This caused a degradation of the insulation material in the joint body, resulting in a cable joint failure. MC advised that the cable joint problem has been a problem at all sites and that they working on an alternative. During February 2015, EA carried out Blade Imaging on all Wind Turbines. The report of this work is due at the end of March. Annual Accreditation and Regulatory Compliance External Audits are scheduled to be carried out at the end of March. Pre-planning for 2015 High Voltage Outage (testing of transformers, circuit breakers, capacitor banks etc.) has been completed with the Outage scheduled to be carried out during May. CP commented that the whole plant will be out for 5 days. 	
4.2	 Proposed Waterloo 2 Wind Farm Update CP provided an update on Waterloo 2. CP indicated that there is not a lot to report on due to EA waiting on government policy determinations (RET – Renewable Energy Target). CP indicated that there is likely to be an overall reduction in RET terawatt hours. The debate in federal government relates to the setting of the RET target somewhere between 31 and 45 terawatt hours, CP's view is it might end up being a target of around 41. CP is hopeful that the RET will be resolved by the July CLG Meeting and suggested that we discuss the matter further at that point. GH – Are you able to give an update of the ACT power purchase opportunity? CP – ACT Government – have selected a number of proponents including Hornsdale (a proposed wind farm north of Jamestown); and a couple of Victorian projects. There will be another stage later this year. AB – What company are building the Hornsdale project at Jamestown? CP – Neo En (French company). The Jamestown project is 6km north of Jamestown. The project is for 105 turbines but likely to be a staged project. 	CP to monitor RET federal policy debate and provide update to CLG at July meeting

	Significant Environmental Benefit (SEB) Program Update – Kapunda to Burra Landscape Project	
	 Anne Brown from Greening Australia and lan Falkenberg from DEWNR provided an update on the SEB funded Project occurring in the region known as the Kapunda to Burra Landscape Project. Greening Australia. The project, is the first stage of a larger program that aims to restore the condition, habitat value and connectivity within and between a series of prominent north-south running ranges between Burra and Kapunda. This area has been identified as a priority landscape for biodiversity conservation because: The area retains significant remnant EPBC listed vegetation associations including Peppermint Box (Eucalyptus odorata) Grassy Woodlands and Iron-grass (Lomandra multiflora) Grasslands. The area includes an important suite of 'Declining Woodland Birds' and the Pygmy Bluetongue Lizard (Tiliqua adelaidensis). A key outcome is to improve the condition and connectivity within and between patches of priority vegetation in the Kapunda to Burra landscape region, including connecting ridges and valleys. The Objectives include: Improving the condition and connectivity within and between patches of priority vegetation in the Kapunda to Burra landscape region. Integrating combination of revegetation, weed and pest control and changes to grazing management practices. Increasing community awareness and providing education. Monitor and Mapping - Identifying, evaluating and mapping the condition of significant Remnant Vegetation. The project potentially involves significant funding over 10 years, on a staged basis, provided criteria are met at key stages along the way. One of the first criteria to meet is to sign up 30 landowners by the end of June 2015, of which there are about 20 interested parties engaged at this stage. GH – Asked if t	



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	 Greening Australian has collected 57kg of seed from 23 species, and found 20 species of herbs. Two very rare species have also been located - the Bendigo Waxflower and Tothill Bushpea.
